## Who is Nelson Mandela?

Nelson Mandela is our symbol for freedom and dignity. He was born on July 18, 1918 in Mvezo, Eastern Cape, the son of a chieftain of the Tembu clan, part of the Xhosa nation. After his father was stripped of his chieftainship he moved with his mother to her home village of Qunu. In 1939, he enrolled at the only black university in South Africa, Fort Hare, where he met his later comrade-in-arms Oliver Tambo. The year after he was expelled. In 1943 he joined the African National Congress. A year later, Mandela, Tambo, Mandela's political mentor Walter Sisulu and Anton Lembede founded the militant ANC Youth League. In 1944, Mandela married his first wife, Evelyn Mase, a nurse and the couple had four children together.

In 1952, Mandela and Tambo opened South Africa's first black law practice. Mandela was also a key organizer of that year's mass Defiance Campaign of civil disobedience, for which he received a suspended sentence of nine months imprisonment with hard labour. In 1956, he was one of 156 people arrested and charged with treason, relating to the ANC Freedom Charter (constitution) signed at a people's congress in Kliptown, Soweto the previous year. At the end of the marathon trial in 1961, all were acquitted.

In 1958, he divorced Evelyn and married Nomzamo Winnie Madikizela. Two years later the ANC was banned and Mandela went into hiding, with the escapades of the 'Black Pimpernel' garnering much media attention. In 1961 the ANC launched its armed wing, Umkhonto weSizwe (Spear of the Nation), with Mandela as commander-in-chief and the group carried out its first act of sabotage. In 1962, on returning from military training overseas, Mandela was arrested and was sentenced to five years in prison, which he began to serve on Robben Island prison off Cape Town. In 1964, he and seven other ANC members were convicted of sabotage and sentenced to life in prison following the landmark Rivonia Trial. Mandela, the main accused, defended his struggle in a four-hour speech from the dock, famously declaring that ending white domination of blacks was an ideal 'for which I am prepared to die.' Mandela returned to Robben Island, where he spent 18 of his total 27 years in prison.

In 1985, with the Free Mandela campaign in full swing internationally, Mandela began talks with the government, first of P.W. Botha, then of F.W. de Klerk, on ending minority white rule. The talks eventually paved the way for the unbanning of the ANC and his release from prison in February 1990. In 1993, Mandela and de Klerk were jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. In 1994, the ANC won a resounding majority in the country's first multi-racial elections and Mandela was sworn in as president.

So was Nelson Mandela trained abroad in sabotage and then imprisoned a freedom fighter or a **“tsirorret”** ?. Who is to judge? The occupiers or the occupied. Is it right to fight for the freedom of an occupied country and its people and with what means.

We wish for more Nelson Mandela to enter history – and to make a difference!

## Nelson Mandela

Nelson Mandela, based his entire life on the principle of dialogue and the art of listening and speaking to others; it is also the art of getting others to listen and speak to each other. This is from his acceptance speech of the Nobel Peace Prize:

*“Together, we join two distinguished South Africans, the late Chief Albert Luthuli and His Grace Archbishop Desmond Tutu, to whose seminal contributions to the peaceful struggle against the evil system of apartheid you paid well-deserved tribute by awarding them the Nobel Peace Prize. It will not be presumptuous of us if we also add, among our predecessors, the name of another outstanding Nobel Peace Prize winner, the late African-American statesman and internationalist, the Rev Martin Luther King Jr. He, too, grappled with and died in the effort to make a contribution to the just solution of the same great issues of the day which we have had to face as South Africans.*

*We speak here of the challenge of the dichotomies of war and peace, violence and non-violence, racism and human dignity, oppression and repression and liberty and human rights, poverty and freedom from want. We stand here today as nothing more than a representative of the millions of our people who dared to rise up against a social system whose very essence is war, violence, racism, oppression, repression and the impoverishment of an entire people.*

*I am also here today as a representative of the millions of people across the globe, the anti-apartheid movement, the governments and organisations that joined with us, not to fight against South Africa as a country or any of its peoples, but to oppose an inhuman system and sue for a speedy end to the apartheid crime against humanity. These countless human beings, both inside and outside our country, had the nobility of spirit to stand in the path of tyranny and injustice, without seeking selfish gain. They recognised that an injury to one is an injury to all and therefore acted together in defence of justice and a common human decency.*

*Because of their courage and persistence for many years, we can, today, even set the dates when all humanity will join together to celebrate one of the outstanding human victories of our century. When that moment comes, we shall, together, rejoice in a common victory over racism, apartheid and white minority rule. That triumph will finally bring to a close a history of five hundred years of African colonisation that began with the establishment of the Portuguese empire. Thus, it will mark a great step forward in history and also serve as a common pledge of the peoples of the world to fight racism wherever it occurs and whatever guise it assumes..... Let the strivings of us all, prove Martin Luther King Jr to have been correct, when he said that humanity can no longer be tragically bound to the starless midnight of racism and war. Let the efforts of us all, prove that he was not a mere dreamer when he spoke of the beauty of genuine brotherhood and peace being more precious than diamonds or silver or gold - Let a new age dawn! “*

## Peace and Love

Alfred Nobel invented dynamite. Dynamite was used for many good things. To build houses and roads. But also for many evil things. To destroy and kill. He was influenced by a woman who was active in the peace movement and also concerned about how the world would remember him – the king of death. So in his last will he created the Nobel Prize it was first awarded in Peace, Literature, Chemistry, Physiology or Medicine, and Physics in 1901. At that time Sweden and Norway was one union under the Swedish king. For this reason Nobel decided the Peace Prize to be awarded in Norway and the other in Sweden. When Norway a few years later wanted their independence from Sweden it could have needed in a severe conflict – but it did not. It was resolved peacefully. Nobel's concern for the use of his invention was however right demonstrated in two devastating world wars and many others. This second thought also hit another great man and Nobel laureate, Albert Einstein when he saw the result of the Nuclear Bomb. "All you need is peace and love".

The founder of the Red Cross, Henry Dunant was the first to receive the Peace Prize. But during periods of war, especially the world wars the prize could naturally not be awarded. "Peace" seemed to be a difficult task. Albert Schweitzer, Martin Luther King, Mother Teresa, Desmond Tutu, Dalai Lama were naturally good choices. Gandhi was murdered the same year he was intended. But then the Prize was given to Prize was surprisingly given to some of the most difficult "conflicts" in the world. ("Conflict" is often used when a strong country try to bomb another country back to the stone age) The war lord Henry Kissinger was given the Peace prize together with The Vietnamese Le Duc To (Who declined). Sadat and Menachim Begin, Yasser Arafat together with Shimon Peres and Yitshak Rabin were all given the Peace Prize for an unresolved "conflict" with 7 million "displaced" Palestinians.

Now we are fighting a new war. The worst war ever. A cruel war. The war against GAIA and life itself. For this reason it was the right thing to do when IPCC and Al Gore was awarded the Peace Prize. But once again we have no peace- we are still investing more in our fossil fueled weapons of mass destruction. And we have not yet understand who are bad guys and the good guys. Who is the real enemy. So to consult another old movie Apocalypse Now –The enemy is within ourselves. We are the bad guys who has to change. To make peace with the planet we have to make peace with ourselves. Albert Schweitzer "Reverence for Life" concludes we are brothers and sisters to all living things, and owe to all of them the same care and respect, that we wish for ourselves. Peace and Love!

The same day July 18 I was reading CNN/Time reporting from a speech by Al Gore the day before. Gore called on Americans to completely abandon electricity generated by fossil fuels within 10 years, and replace them with carbon-free renewable like solar, wind and geothermal. It is a bold plan, almost to the point of folly. But at the very least, it's one that certainly matches the scale of his rhetoric. "The survival of the United States of America as we know it is at risk," he said. "The future of human civilization is at stake."

## What Gore said and what Time/CNN commented on July

So this is what Bryan Walsh commented on July 18: Gore is right but what he is saying is “wrong” – a mistake and it may hurt the Democrats. So who shall speak the truth? If neither politicians nor media will do it - who shall dare to speak the truth?

*“The man who has in the past called climate change a “moral and spiritual challenge” sounded more pragmatic notes. While sounding the alarm on melting Arctic ice and strange weather, Gore also emphasized the financial toll that high gasoline prices were taking on average Americans, and the security threat posed by our increased dependence on foreign oil.....*

*It remains impossible for most people to connect what comes out of our wall sockets to morality, or to believe that the nation needs to embark on a massive restructuring of its energy policy. But national security, or foreign oil dependency or high energy prices are all talking points that just might get a majority of Americans to support going green.....*

*... but doing it in 10 years? If the earlier, personal solutions to global warming — drive a hybrid, put in better insulation — were far too little, Gore's goal seems far too much.....Gore: “To those who say 10 years is not enough time, I respectfully ask them to consider what the world's scientists are telling us about the risks we face if we don't act in 10 years,” he said. He's right. A number of scientists, though not all, warn that the world has a decade at most to reverse the growth in greenhouse gas emissions, or risk catastrophic climate change. But here's the fact that keeps me up at night: **Gore and his allies could be right.** We may simply be technologically and politically incapable of doing anything about it. **Maybe we've already run out of time, and we just don't know it.***

*Night terrors aside, **the 10-year target is a mistake for strategic reasons.** It feeds into the perception still held by a large number of Americans that Gore is an alarmist, and alarmists can be ignored. Such a wildly ambitious goal sets us up for failure, and obscures the fact that the battle against climate change won't be won in a decade, or even two — it will last for the foreseeable future and beyond. **(And if you think Gore has thoughts about returning to the political arena, forget it. His speech couldn't have come at a worse time for Democrats, who are already fighting off accusations that they're insensitive to rising gas prices.)....***

*.... decarbonizing our energy supply will require innovation, funding and sacrifice at every level of society. It will be long and arduous, and even if it works, we won't be rewarded with stirring film of a man on the moon. The spoils of this fight will be a world that will perhaps be less worse off than it would have been had nothing been done. **What we most need is time to make these changes, but that's what we've squandered. If only someone else had been President these past eight years — someone like, well, Al Gore.”***

Because we also have the ability to neglect, to destroy, to cause suffering and death. And indeed some suffering and death is inevitable. Even vegetarians can only survive by eating some living thing. Reverence for Life is not some cranky and impossible commandment. It just says we must be aware of what we’re doing.*

*We must take responsibility for what we do when we harvest a crop of grain, when we eat the bread that’s made from it, when we grill a steak, when we kill a dangerous insect. The key is awareness. Which makes us more alive.*

*For life is extraordinary. Every scientific advance tells us this. We now know the billion to one chances ever since the Big Bang that have enabled life to develop and then to survive on this planet, and the extreme rarity of it in the universe. More than ever, we have good reason to feel reverence for it.*

## People without land

Our white supremacy history is ugly. The European invasion of America and Australia with the genocide of the native people, the slave trade and the colonization of large part of Asia and Africa. But interacting with these societies I experience a very different reality compared to what is presented by our media. I have for example met more female managers in Iran than in most other western countries.

So now of the real issue. Israel is with western support occupying large part of Palestine. USA and some other western states are occupying Iraq and Afghanistan and supporting other "Friendly" Arab states with various forms of dictatorship - and oil. The tiny emirates like Kuwait and Dubai got their independence by US and UK oil interest. Today they are "westernized" with large free-ways, luxury hotels, slave workers and "maids" from Asia. Ruled by extremely rich royalties and admired by the free media of the west. These countries including Saudi Arabia are supported by US as "free".. Iran and Syria are the horrible and evil states with all sorts of crimes.....Whenever people in a democratic election will select another government like in Palestine they are punished by west. So what are we supporting. Freedom? For who?

## Who is a refugee? (Palestine)

UNRWA's operational definition, Palestine refugees are persons whose normal place of residence was Palestine between June 1946 and May 1948, who lost both their homes and means of livelihood as a result of the 1948 Arab-Israeli conflict. UNRWA's services are available to all those living in its area of operations who meet this definition, who are registered with the Agency and who need assistance. UNRWA's definition of a refugee also covers the descendants of persons who became refugees in 1948. The number of registered Palestine refugees has subsequently grown from 914,000 in 1950 to more than 4.4 million in 2005, and continues to rise due to natural population growth.

When Israel was created 1948 this also created the Palestine refugees without a land. When Israel occupied more of Palestine this created more refugees. This are now spread around the world. Of the 9.6 million Palestinians worldwide (Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics, 2004): about 7.2 million are refugees. 4.4 million are UNRWA registered Palestinian refugees and descendants from the 1948 displacement and 33% of these refugees live in UNRWA's 59 refugee camps inside the Occupied Palestinian Territories and the neighbouring Arab countries.

1.7 million are not registered with UNRWA (BADIL, 2005). 834,000 are Palestinian refugees and their descendants from the 1967 displacement (BADIL, 2005) 355,000 Palestinians and their descendants are internally displaced inside Israel (BADIL, 2005) • 57,000 Palestinians have become internally displaced in the occupied Palestinian West Bank as a result of home demolitions, revocation of residency rights and construction of illegal settlements on confiscated Palestinian-owned land. Of these, 15,000 have been displaced by Israel's Annexation/Apartheid Wall. (BADIL, 2005) 6,000 Palestinians have been deported from the Occupied Territories between 1967 and the early 1990s (BADIL, 2005) • 100,000 have had their residency rights revoked by Israel (BADIL, 2005).

The UNHRC 2007 global report recently published. UNWRA handles Palestine and UNHRC the other countries. UNWRA say in their report that besides Palestine the main refugee countries today is Iraq and Afghanistan.


The UNHRC 2007 global report: *“The Middle East sub region continued to deal with the complex displacement of millions of Iraqis, including 2.2 million people inside Iraq and up to two million refugees.....*

*.....Despite the generosity of countries hosting Iraqi refugees – especially the Syrian Arab Republic and Jordan – the situation of over two million Iraqi internally displaced persons (IDPs) and a similar number of Iraqi refugees is dire. Women and children, both inside Iraq and in neighboring countries, continue to be affected by various forms of gender-based violence and exploitation, including trafficking, survival sex and child labour.....*

*.....However, the presence of some two million Iraqi refugees, particularly in the Syrian Arab Republic and Jordan, put an excessive burden on the economies and infrastructure of these countries. Syria and Jordan also host a large number of Palestinian refugees.”*

So the “bad” country of Syria take care of more than 2 Million refugees from Iraq and Palestine. So how many refugees from Iraq does USA receives. Less than what the city of Södertälje in Sweden receives. Less than 7000 people.

## The cost of oil





The UNHRC 2007 global report:

*“Seven years after the replacement of the Taliban by an internationally supported administration, Afghanistan’s transition to political, economic and social stability remains uncertain. Making progress towards the goals set by the Afghanistan Compact in January 2006 has proved problematic for both the Government and the international community.*

*Internal political tensions, weak public administration and lack of coordination between international actors have compromised the effectiveness of the aid process. As a consequence, most of the benchmarks established under the Compact have not been met. The process of cooperating on the National Development Strategy has also highlighted the differing priorities of the international community.*

*The year 2007 saw the highest number of security incidents since the fall of the Taliban in 2002. The danger of attacks increased sharply in the southern, south-eastern and eastern regions and spread to the northern and central regions. The capital, Kabul, replaced Kandahar as the primary target of anti-Government activities. The insurgency relied increasingly on suicide bombings, improvised explosive devices and kidnapping against “soft” targets.*

*International development and humanitarian actors could reach barely half the country; as a result, they had to rely to an increasing extent on national partners for programme delivery and monitoring. The combination of deteriorating security and slow progress in reconstruction and development made it difficult for a large part of the population to meet essential needs. Needs assessments conducted by the Office and partners confirmed that shelter remains the greatest.”*

And the export of opium has quadrupled! The free market is back. And there are not so many happy birthdays.

So the legacy of George W Bush is more than 1 million dead men, women and children and about 7 Million refugees Add to this another 7 million Palestinians without a land and you get a very high moral price to pay for the western oil supply. Are we already in a George Orwell society when the concentration of media ownership and the effective lobbying and planting of news is working 100%. Or is this conspiracy theory not at all right. In the latter case we must have had a total break down of journalism. Or the third even more scare is that this is what we want to consume, Don't worry be happy!
